Dr. Haidar will contact parents who expressed their willingness to be a SBAI Science Fair Judge soon. A short meeting will be held at 4:00 on November 8 at SBAI pod to disc uss Science Fair Rubric and other logistics. Ten fina list from SBAI Science Fa ir will be recommended for the District Science Fair competition (Date not yet a nnounced). District Science Fair winners will move to Science and Engineering Fa ir of Houston for presentation on February 15, 2020 at George R. Brown Convention Center. We are excited to announce that on October 29th and 30th of this school year, we will provide every student at Stratford High School with the opportunity to participate in the Spring Branch ISD Chromebook Loaner Program. With this device, students will have access to anywhere, anytime learning and will be able to engage with their classes, teachers, and peers in new and exciting ways.

It is our expectation that every student will come to school each day with a portable computer charged for a full day of use. Students have the option to bring a laptop from home or participate in the Chromebook Loaner Program. This will enable students to access itsLearning, a learning management system already being used in our classes to access course content.

Prior to receiving Chromebooks, students will need to have the SBISD Student Device Loan Agreement signed by a parent or guardian. The second page of this agreement should be returned to the library. This document addresses the loan conditions as well as the optional $\$ 25.00$ technology damage coverage.

Please read the coverage agreement carefully as it is specific with regards to financial responsibility and what is and is not covered by the optional damage coverage. If you elect to purchase the Optional Technology Damage Coverage, then you may pay by check (payable to Stratford HS), cash in exact amount, or through MySchoolBucks, a secure online payment system accepting credit cards, debit cards, and electronic checks.

Any student who prefers to bring their own device to school can opt out of the Chromebook Loaner Program as long as the device has a screen size of at least 9 inches, has keyboard capability, and has the ability to connect to the school's wireless network. All students will be expected to abide by the SBISD Student Acceptable Use Policy regardless of the device they use.

# STRATFORD HIGH SCHOOL CLUBS AND ORGANIZATIONS 2019-2020 

## Academy of Finance

Sponsors: Ms. Schaper \& Ms. Jackson

This is a specialized program for juniors and seniors who are interested in a career in the financial services industry. Students apply for the Stratford AOF at the beginning of their junior year. Before high school graduation, the following courses are to be completed: Accounting I, Business Information Management (BIM), Money Matters, which are all one year classes. In addition, one class from the following selection is required: Accounting II, Banking and Financial Systems, Business Law, Dollars and Sense, Global Business or Principles of Business, Marketing and Finance. A key feature of the Academy of Finance is a supervised 160 hour paid or unpaid internship that enhances classroom learning. Typically, this internship is completed after the summer of the student's junior year or during their senior year. A certificate of Financial Studies will be awarded to each student upon successful completion of the courses and internship. During their senior year, students have an opportunity to visit the financial district in New York City.

## Academy of Science and Engineering <br> Sponsors: Mr. Barrett \& <br> Mr. Avis

The Stratford Academy of Science and Engineering is a selective group of juniors and seniors who apply for the program their sophomore year. ASE encourages high levels of academic competence to students in the area of science through experiences in the high school science classroom and extended experiences in offcampus activities in the Houston community. Students enrolled in the Academy are required to complete a rigorous science and mathematics curriculum which includes AP level courses. In addition, Academy juniors participate in a lab class designed to expose them to careers in science and engineering. Field trips to local business and university research labs are preceded by related research and lab work on campus. Academy seniors are required to complete a Research and Design project. Small teams of students work with community mentors on projects that can be relevant to the current research issues in both industry and academia. Academy students also are expected to complete a minimum number of science-related service hours through tutoring, teacher assistance, or external volunteer work.
